Bryan Fyson is a 31-year-old life-long farmer from Perdue, Saskatchewan. In 2004, Bryan had a snowmobile accident that resulted in a T12 spinal cord injury.

After his accident, farming was difficult, but with the help of his family and friends, he learned to adapt and was able to continue the work he loves. His only frustration was that he had to rely on others to get in and out of his combine. Spinal Cord Injury Saskatchewan was able to help Bryan build an electric lift for his combine. Bryan has regained his independence in his work life.

Chair-Leaders is scheduled for one morning – May 23, 2018. All Chair-Leaders will be invited to a continental breakfast followed by a safe-wheeling session before heading into the office. There they will conduct their daily work by swapping their desk chair for a wheelchair.

| 8:30 am | Participants head to work with their Activity Challenge Checklist. |
| 8:30 -11:30 am | Wheelchair Activity Challenge. Participants will be given a list of about 20 activities or challenges to try while on the job. |
| 11:45 am -12:45 pm | Luncheon, photos and award presentations. |

Did you know?

When Spinal Cord Injury Saskatchewan helps just one person return to the workforce, the benefits to Canada easily exceed \$350,000 (based on receiving an earned income of \$30,000 per year vs. receiving government disability benefits of \$10,000)

Average cost of a manual wheelchair is \$4,000 to \$5,000

Chair-Leaders can go a long way to including greater numbers of people with disabilities in the workforce.
